## HAPPY NEW YEAR!

### **A Crisp New Page**

There is just something nice about new things that get people excited. Perhaps I'm odd, but I derive a great amount of enjoyment from peeling the plastic off of new things. I guess in some ways I'm like the kid that would rather play with a box than the actual toy it contained, because when I get a new phone or other device I love the feel and sound of peeling that layer of plastic film from the top. The exposed device underneath is pristine, it is untouched, it is unmarred, and nothing but a life of possibility lay in front it. Maybe you have some peculiarity associated with new things: the feel of the crisp pages of a new book, the smell inside a new car, the vibrancy of a new shirt, or smell of brand new leather. There is value in the potential of new. For a few minutes let me share with you two ways we can look at "new" and extricate from it a spiritual application (**Rom. 8:6**).

Firstly, something new is unbroken. It has not weathered the storm, it has not taken abuse at the hands of anyone, and it has not seen discouragement. Take a look at some of your old things. How much wear and tear have you wrought on your possessions? Even things we love bear the marks of use. Something new, in some ways, affords us the opportunity to turn the page (pun intended). Perhaps everyone honest enough to admit it could compile a list of things they wished they'd done differently last year. We could recall to mind words we spoke that smacked someone harder than we intended, actions we left undone that could have benefited someone else, feelings that created distance between friends or family, forgiveness that should have been given, movies that shouldn't have been watched, and ultimately, decisions we wish we had made with greater care, prayer, and consideration. Though we're human and we're going to make mistakes, that doesn't excuse us from attempting to live righteously (**Titus 2:11-13**). Rather, it should fill us with greater resolve to not repeat them, to prove to ourselves and to God that our faith is maturing and we along with it (**Heb. 5:12-14**). How should one deal with the mistakes of yesteryear? Persevere:

"Not that I have already attained, or am already perfected; but I press on, that I may lay hold of that for which Christ Jesus has also laid hold of me. <sup>13</sup>Brethren, I do not count myself to have apprehended; but one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things which are ahead, <sup>14</sup>I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus." -**Philippians 2:12-14**

Secondly, something new has untapped potential. Someone once said that "potential means you haven't done anything yet." We are only one day into January; only one day in to the year 2022. Who knows what it holds for you? Will you cry, laugh, mourn, or rejoice? Probably all of the above in some way, shape, or form. Will you mature, learn, evangelize, teach, preach, sing, study, edify, unify, forgive, and pursue righteousness? That's up to you. The year is brand new. The day is brand new. Every time God grants us a "New Year" many overlook its immense value. Often there are the traditional "new year's resolutions" made, but generally forgotten by February, if they ever see the light of January. Don't waste the "new" God has just delivered to you. Appreciate the blank slate that lies out before you and remember the God who has provided you the hope to live it in joy and peace.

## OUR EYES ARE FOR SEEING

Have you ever known anyone that was blind? I once met a lady that was deaf, dumb, and blind. She was an incredible woman who faithfully attended worship, signed with her hands, and smiled as though she was a normal individual.

I can't imagine what it would be like to live like that. I appreciate the ability to hear, see, and speak, as I am sure all who have those abilities do. I wonder, however, how well we use those gifts. Do we use them to their best advantages? I wonder if we don't misuse any or all of these more than using them for the purpose God intended. Notice that God gave us two ears, two eyes, and just one mouth. I think that fact speaks for itself.

As we begin a new year, I want us to think particularly about our eyes and what we will see in 2022. It really depends on us to determine what will catch our attention in the year ahead. We will certainly continue to see people in masks, failed businesses, homeless men and women begging on street corners, and many other signs of the ongoing pandemic. We can easily see that our world has been forever changed. We can, however, just as easily see the good things; and that is what I want us to see.

In the book of First Corinthians, Paul was writing to fellow Christians about collecting money to send to the church in Jerusalem. The churches in Galatia were doing the same thing, taking up money to support the less fortunate. Paul says that he will accompany those whom they, the church in Corinth, select to carry these funds to their fellow Christians. He promises to visit with the Christians at Corinth after making a trip through Macedonia. He says he plans to stay through the winter with them so they can encourage him on his journey. Then Paul says something that gives me the basis for saying that our eyes are for seeing. He says, *"But I will stay in Ephesus until Pentecost, for a wide door for effective work has opened to me, and there are many adversaries"* (First Corinthians 16:8-9 ESV).

Paul was looking forward to visiting Corinth, taking their contributions to Jerusalem, and visiting with the Christians in the City of David. His plans were temporarily changed because he "saw" an opportunity. A door was opened, and he saw that there were adversaries

in the way of the opportunity. So, he stayed where he could do the most good.

I suggest that we all miss opportunities. We miss them either because we don't recognize them, or we simply ignore them. I think we ignore them because we see adversaries; and we either don't want to deal with them or don't know how.

We need to look for opportunities to share the gospel, opportunities to serve, opportunities to be kind. All of these represent an opportunity to show our Christianity to those with whom we come in contact.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus talked about our example to the world. He said, *"You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven"* (Matthew 5:14-16).

As we begin the new year, may we choose as our primary resolution to open our eyes and see opportunities to be a light to others. After all, Jesus commanded it.
